#### Project Location: Harrodsburg, KY (528 Ada Drive, Harrodsburg, KY 40330-1012)

#### Description of the Proposed Project [24 CFR 50.12 & 58.32; 40 CFR 1508.25]:

Isaiah House, Inc. is seeking \$415,000 in Recovery Housing Program funding to support affordable housing for rehabilitation clients in central Kentucky. The project will include the renovation of a currently owned and unoccupied property located in Mercer County to provide 6 additional Recovery Housing Beds as well as to provide rental assistance in approximately 24 properties in Washington and Mercer Counties. The renovation at 528 Ada Drive in Harrodsburg is estimated to cost \$30,000. This renovation includes minor interior improvements: new kitchen flooring, kitchen and bathroom upgrades, the addition of one bathroom, and upgrades to improve energy efficiency and safety (windows, electrical plugs). Recovery Housing funding will also be utilized to provide rental assistance for individuals who are newly transitioning to recovery housing units that are located in Washington and 14 beds (female) in Mercer County. Weekly rent is based on a sliding scale according to income (no more than 30%) and will follow HOME affordable rent guidelines. The average weekly rent paid is \$120 x 52 weeks = \$6,240 annually x 57 clients (historically 50% of beds will be filled with new clients during the grant period) = \$356,000.

When a person completes a residential treatment program, they are often forced to enter the workforce with few job skills and work experience. Without outside help, it is difficult for most of them to find the resources to pay for rent, much less purchase furnishings and household supplies. Isaiah House recovery housing provides a transitional safe space, with the organization sometimes assisting in rent, utilities, and upkeep regardless of whether the residents have funds to make a regular rental payment or not. This enables most to become settled and pursue secured employment. Unfortunately, we are forced to turn others away because revenue is not sufficient to support this service. Support from the Recovery Housing Program will provide resources for Isaiah House to increase recovery housing beds available through the renovation of an unoccupied property, as well as by increasing access through rental assistance for people who are classified as very low to moderate income.

Most Isaiah House recovery houses were originally single-family homes that have been converted to serve 4 to 12 residents. This requires renovations to be made to common areas, additional bathrooms, upgraded kitchens, and oftentimes the conversion of spare rooms to bedrooms. The home in this project also requires electrical and energy upgrades to make it safe and efficient for recovery housing. Outside funding to cover renovation expenses is critical to getting these properties ready for occupancy. We are also requesting funding to be used for rental assistance for new residents. Currently, over 85% of Isaiah House clients are Medicaid recipients, meaning that their income does not exceed 138% of the federal poverty level. Monthly income limits for Kentucky Medicaid are \$217, which demonstrates the extreme poverty of individuals leaving residential treatment and transferring to recovery housing. Most do not have jobs or other sources of income when transitioning from the residential treatment program to the recovery program. Isaiah House will document each resident's LMI eligibility prior to occupancy, using current HUD LMI income limits through a standard survey.

Over the past two years, Isaiah House has had to face challenges brought upon by the COVID-19 pandemic. Isaiah House has remained open throughout the pandemic, which has required the

organization to implement numerous safety protocols, including quarantine housing for residential clients at risk or who have tested positive, increasing PPE equipment/supplies available for clients and staff, and hiring temporary staff to cover for employees who have been diagnosed with COVID or had been exposed. COVID-19 contributed to increased supply and personnel expenses for temporary staff and overtime pay needed to cover essential staff who were quarantined. Additional property was rented to provide quarantine housing, and Isaiah House invested in virtual technology and telehealth counseling. Initially, the organization saw an increase in the number of clients leaving treatment before completion primarily due to the elimination of family visits and offsite activities. Recreational equipment and art/music therapy helped reduce that trend.

COVID-19 has also made the availability of recovery housing even more critical. According to the CDC, 1,956 Kentucky residents lost their lives to overdose between September 2019 and September 2020. This was a 50% increase over the previous 12 months and the third highest state escalation. In 2020, Isaiah House experienced a 43% increase over 2019 in Kentucky residents who received treatment for substance abuse through one of their residential, outpatient, or transitional living programs. The virus also impacted Isaiah House's own staff. The organization had over 120 staff and 61 clients test positive for COVID-19 between April 2020 and June 2021. Two of their women's centers were even forced to close as a result of COVID outbreaks.

## Statement of Purpose and Need for the Proposal [40 CFR 1508.9(b)]:

In order for the region to be resilient moving forward, it is evident that additional Recovery Housing Programs, treatment facilities, and sober environments that foster rehabilitation and workforce reentry are a must. The 2020 Covid19 Pandemic and emergency executive orders brought many challenges to Franklin County Women and Family Shelter. All shelters were instructed to put in place safety measures including functioning at 50% capacity. Thus, FCWFS's community was tasked with opening a temporary emergency shelter. FCWFS partnered with two other shelter agencies, Frankfort/Franklin County Emergency Management and the local FIS High School to open an emergency shelter in the high school gymnasium. From April 2020 to June 2020, the shelter agencies provided all necessities, including extra staffing at the gym facility, transportation and recreational activities for the displaced. 1,029 nights of shelter services were provided to 81 co-ed clients with numerous backgrounds and in varying demographic categories while adhering to Covid-19 guidelines. Throughout 2020, Central Kentucky saw a significant uptick in illicit drug use and abuse, especially in the number of drug-related hospitalizations and deaths.

Isaiah House, Inc. is seeking \$415,000 in Recovery Housing Program funding to support affordable housing for rehabilitation clients in central Kentucky. The project will include the renovation of a currently owned and unoccupied property located in Mercer County to provide 6 additional Recovery Housing Beds as well as to provide rental assistance in approximately 24 properties in Washington and Mercer Counties. The renovation at 528 Ada Drive in Harrodsburg is estimated to cost \$30,000. This renovation includes minor interior improvements: new kitchen flooring, kitchen and bathroom upgrades, the addition of one bathroom, and upgrades to improve energy efficiency and safety (windows, electrical plugs). Recovery Housing funding will also be utilized to provide rental assistance for individuals who are newly transitioning to recovery housing units that are located in Washington and Mercer Counties. These individuals will have access to 100 beds (male) in Washington and 14 beds (female) in Mercer County. Weekly rent is based on a sliding scale according to income (no more than 30%) and will follow HOME affordable rent guidelines. The average weekly rent paid is \$120 x 52 weeks = \$6,240 annually x 57 clients (historically 50% of beds will be filled with new clients during the grant period) = \$356,000.

When a person completes a residential treatment program, they are often forced to enter the workforce with few job skills and work experience. Without outside help, it is difficult for most of them to find the resources to pay for rent, much less purchase furnishings and household supplies. Isaiah House recovery housing provides a transitional safe space, with the organization sometimes assisting in rent, utilities, and upkeep regardless of whether the residents have funds to make a regular rental payment or not. This enables most to become settled and pursue secured employment. Unfortunately, we are forced to turn others away because revenue is not sufficient to support this service. Support from the Recovery Housing Program will provide resources for Isaiah House to increase recovery housing beds available through the renovation of an unoccupied property, as well as by increasing access through rental assistance for people who are classified as very low to moderate income.

Most Isaiah House recovery houses were originally single-family homes that have been converted to serve 4 to 12 residents. This requires renovations to be made to common areas, additional bathrooms, upgraded kitchens, and oftentimes the conversion of spare rooms to bedrooms. The home in this project also requires electrical and energy upgrades to make it safe and efficient for recovery housing. Outside funding to cover renovation expenses is critical to getting these properties ready for occupancy. We are also requesting funding to be used for rental assistance for new residents. Currently, over 85% of Isaiah House clients are Medicaid recipients, meaning that their income does not exceed 138% of the federal poverty level. Monthly income limits for Kentucky Medicaid are \$217, which demonstrates the extreme poverty of individuals leaving residential treatment and transferring to recovery housing. Most do not have jobs or other sources of income when transitioning from the residential treatment program to the recovery program. Isaiah House will document each resident's LMI eligibility prior to occupancy, using current HUD LMI income limits through a standard survey.

Over the past two years, Isaiah House has had to face challenges brought upon by the COVID-19 pandemic. Isaiah House has remained open throughout the pandemic, which has required the organization to implement numerous safety protocols, including quarantine housing for residential clients at risk or who have tested positive, increasing PPE equipment/supplies available for clients and staff, and hiring temporary staff to cover for employees who have been diagnosed with COVID or had been exposed. COVID-19 contributed to increased supply and personnel expenses for temporary staff and overtime pay needed to cover essential staff who were

quarantined. Additional property was rented to provide quarantine housing, and Isaiah House invested in virtual technology and telehealth counseling. Initially, the organization saw an increase in the number of clients leaving treatment before completion primarily due to the elimination of family visits and offsite activities. Recreational equipment and art/music therapy helped reduce that trend.

COVID-19 has also made the availability of recovery housing even more critical. According to the CDC, 1,956 Kentucky residents lost their lives to overdose between September 2019 and September 2020. This was a 50% increase over the previous 12 months and the third highest state escalation. In 2020, Isaiah House experienced a 43% increase over 2019 in Kentucky residents who received treatment for substance abuse through one of their residential, outpatient, or transitional living programs. The virus also impacted Isaiah House's own staff. The organization had over 120 staff and 61 clients test positive for COVID-19 between April 2020 and June 2021. Two of their women's centers were even forced to close as a result of COVID outbreaks.

Over the past two years, Isaiah House has had to face challenges brought upon by the COVID-19 pandemic. Isaiah House has remained open throughout the pandemic, which has required the organization to implement numerous safety protocols, including quarantine housing for residential clients at risk or who have tested positive, increasing PPE equipment/supplies available for clients and staff, and hiring temporary staff to cover for employees who have been diagnosed with COVID or had been exposed. COVID-19 contributed to increased supply and personnel expenses for temporary staff and overtime pay needed to cover essential staff who were quarantined. Additional property was rented to provide quarantine housing, and Isaiah House invested in virtual technology and telehealth counseling. Initially, the organization saw an increase in the number of clients leaving treatment before completion primarily due to the elimination of family visits and offsite activities. Recreational equipment and art/music therapy helped reduce that trend.

COVID-19 has also made the availability of recovery housing even more critical. According to the CDC, 1,956 Kentucky residents lost their lives to overdose between September 2019 and September 2020. This was a 50% increase over the previous 12 months and the third highest state escalation. In 2020, Isaiah House experienced a 43% increase over 2019 in Kentucky residents who received treatment for substance abuse through one of their residential, outpatient, or transitional living programs. The virus also impacted Isaiah House's own staff. The organization had over 120 staff and 61 clients test positive for COVID-19 between April 2020 and June 2021. Two of their women's centers were even forced to close as a result of COVID outbreaks.

Such endorsement means this agency has found no major concerns from the review of the proposed project as presented other than those stated as conditions or comments.

### Division for Air Quality

Kentucky Division for Air Quality Regulation 401 KAR 63:010 Fugitive Emissions states that no person shall cause, suffer, or allow any material to be handled, processed, transported, or stored without taking reasonable precaution to prevent particulate matter from becoming airborne. Additional requirements include the covering of open bodied trucks, operating outside the work area transporting materials likely to become airborne, and that no one shall allow earth or other material being transported by truck or earth moving equipment to be deposited onto a paved street or roadway. Regulation 401 KAR 63:005 states that open burning is prohibited. Open Burning is defined as the burning of any matter in such a manner that the products of combustion resulting from the burning are emitted directly into the atmosphere without passing through a stack or chimney. However, open burning may be utilized for the expressed purposes listed on the http://air.ky.gov/Pages/OpenBurning.aspx.

Kentucky Division for Air Quality Regulation 401 KAR 58:025, Asbestos Standards, apply to this project if any renovation or demolition occurs. If so, a Kentucky Accredited Asbestos Inspector must inspect the project. Asbestos that will be affected by this activity must be removed by a Kentucky accredited contractor before renovation or demolition begins. Written notification must be given on form DEP 7036 to the Division for Air Quality Regional Office at least 10 weekdays prior the start of demolition or renovation, whether or not asbestos has been identified to be present. Please note form: http://air.ky.gov/Pages/AsbestosInformation.aspx

All solid waste generated by this project must be disposed at a permitted facility. If underground storage tanks are encountered they must be properly addressed. If asbestos, lead paint, and/or other contaminants are encountered during this project, they must be properly addressed.

If the proposed project site is in a designated flood hazard area, application must be made to the Division of Water for a floodplain construction permit. Permission, or exemption, depends upon design and the exact site.

If the construction area disturbed is equal to or greater than 1 acre, the applicant will need to apply for a Kentucky Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (KPDES) stormwater discharge permit from Division of Water.

Best Management Practices (BMPs) should be utilized to control storm water runoff and sediment damage to water quality and aquatic habitat. For technical assistance on the kinds of BMPs most appropriate for projects of this type and related construction, please contact the local Soil and Water Conservation District or the Division of Conservation.

Utility line projects that cross a stream will require a Section 404 permit from the US Army Corps of Engineers and a 401 Water Quality Certification from DOW.

WATER SUPPLY - If an existing water server is to be utilized for new water tap-ons (rehabilitations, new constructions), ascertain the capacity and operating condition of the originating water treatment plant and of the server (if different) in comparison to the water needs of the proposed housing. DOW cannot permit connections to water servers Agreed Orders, or Court Orders. DOW may not give approval to connections to water systems operating near, at, or over capacity. If a new water source is to be utilized, ascertain the source's (stream's or well's)

low flow ability to serve the proposed housing. Prior approval from DOW is required for water withdrawals of over 10,000 gallons per day and for all public drinking water. Final plans and specifications are subject to review by DOW.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT - If an existing wastewater server is to be utilized for new wastewater tap-ons (rehabilitations, new construction), ascertain the capacity and operating conditions of the receiving wastewater treatment facility (wastewater treatment plant or package sewage treatment plant) and of the server (if different) in comparison to the wastewater needs of the proposed housing. DOW cannot permit connections to wastewater servers under tap-on bans, Agreed Orders, or Court Orders. DOW may not give approval to connections to wastewater systems at or over hydraulic capacity. If a new wastewater treatment, facility is to be utilized, ascertain the discharge stream's ability to absorb the proposed projects treated wastewater.

Prior approval from DOW is required for all discharges into streams and for all wastewater treatment facilities.

DOW notes the requirements of onsite sewage disposal statutes, KRS 211.350 to 211.380, and administrative regulations, 902 KAR 10:060 to 10:110, must be met. DOW requests provisions be made for future connections to a wastewater treatment system. A Groundwater Protection Plan, as required by 401 KAR 5:037, needs to be prepared by all onsite wastewater system owners. Contact the DOW regarding requirements.



The Office of Coast Survey depicts on its nautical charts the territorial sea (12 nautical miles), contiguous zone (24nm), and exclusive economic zone (200nm, plus maritime boundaries with adjacent/opposite countries).



### **General Information**

NOAA is responsible for depicting on its nautical charts the limits of the 12 nautical mile territorial sea, 24 nautical mile contiguous zone, and 200 nautical mile Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ). These zones are highlighted in orange.



### **Territorial Sea**

The territorial sea is a maritime zone over which the United States exercises sovereignty. Sovereignty extends to the airspace above and to the seabed below the territorial sea. The U.S. territorial sea extends 12 nautical miles from the baseline.

### **Contiguous Zone**

The contiguous zone of the United States is a zone contiguous to the territorial sea. In this zone, the U.S. may exercise the control necessary to prevent and punish infringement of its customs, fiscal, immigration, cultural heritage, or sanitary laws and regulations within its territory or territorial sea. The U.S. contiguous zone is measured 24 nautical miles from the baseline.

### Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ)

The exclusive economic zone (EEZ) of the U.S. extends 200 nautical miles from the territorial sea baseline and is adjacent to the 12 nm territorial sea of the U.S., overlapping the 12-24nm contiguous zone. Within the EEZ, the U.S. has:

- sovereign rights for the purpose of exploring, exploiting, conserving and managing natural resources, whether living and nonliving, of the seabed and subsoil and the superjacent waters and with regard to other activities for the economic exploitation and exploration of the zone, such as the production of energy from the water, currents and winds
- jurisdiction as provided for in international and domestic laws with regard to the establishment and use of artificial islands, installations, and structures, marine scientific research, and the protection and preservation of the marine environment
- · other rights and duties provided for under international and domestic laws

Certain U.S. fisheries laws use the term "exclusive economic zone" ("EEZ"). While its outer limit is the same as the EEZ on NOAA charts, the inner limit generally extends landward to the seaward boundary of the coastal states of the U.S. For the seaward limit of the states jurisdiction under the Submerged Lands Act, please see GIS Data / Shapefiles (https://www.boem.gov/Oil-and-Gas-Energy-Program/Mapping-and-Data/Index.aspx).

# Sole Source Aquifers in the Southeast

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) defines a sole source aquifer as an underground water source that supplies at least 50 percent of the drinking water consumed in the area overlying the aquifer. These areas have no alternative drinking water source(s) that could physically, legally, and economically supply all those who depend upon the aquifer for drinking water.

The <u>Sole Source Aquifer Program</u> is authorized by Section 1424(e) of the Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974. Designation of an aquifer as a sole source aquifer provides EPA with the authority to review federal financially assisted projects planned for the area to determine their potential for contaminating the aquifer.

Federally funded projects reviewed by EPA under the Sole Source Aquifer Program may include, but are not limited to, highway improvements and new road construction, public water supply wells, transmission lines, wastewater treatment facilities, construction projects involving disposal of storm water, and agricultural projects involving management of animal waste. Proposed projects that are funded entirely by state, local, or private concerns are not subject to EPA review.





# **Approximate Boundaries of Region 4 Sole Source Aquifers**


**Biscayne Sole Source Aquifer & Recharge Zones** 






The Biscayne Aquifer lies within an area of south Florida bounded by the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico between Whitewater Bay in Monroe County and Delray Beach in Palm Beach County; and by a line drawn from the mouth of Whitewater Bay northeasterly and northerly to the intersection of the northern boundary of Monroe County and the western boundary of Dade County; and thence northerly and northeasterly to the intersection of the North New River Canal and the boundary line separating Broward and Palm Beach Counties; and finally east-northeasterly to Delray Beach. The enclosed area includes all of Dade County and parts of Broward, Monroe and Palm Beach Counties.

#### Southern Hills Regional Aquifer System



The designation area covers all of ten parishes in Louisiana (E. Baton Rouge, E. Feliciana, Livingston, Pointe Coupee, St. Helena, St. Tammany, Tangipahoa, Washington, W. Baton Rouge and W. Feliciana) and in Mississippi all of ten counties (Adams, Amite, Claiborne, Copiah, Franklin, Jefferson, Lincoln, Pike, Walthall and Wilkinson) as well as the parts of Hinds and Warren Counties underlain by the Catahoula Sandstone, and those portions of Marion and Lawrence Counties west of the Pearl River.

### Volusia Sole Source Aquifer



The northern boundary of the designated area begins at the southeast corner of Flagler Beach State Park and curves south and west through the community of Karona at U.S. Highway Route Number 1. The boundary continues southwest, west and northwest to the intersection of Haw Creek and Crescent Lake. The boundary then follows the west bank of Crescent Lake to Dunn's Creek and follows the west bank of Dunn's Creek to its intersection with the St. John's River. The border of the designated area then follows the east bank of Lake George to its intersection with the boundary of Volusia County. The boundary of the designated area and the boundary of Volusia county are congruent for the remainder of the area's western and southern boundaries to the Atlantic Ocean. The area's eastern boundary is the Atlantic Ocean.

The designated area includes all of Volusia County and portions of Flagler and Putnam Counties, Florida and extends approximately 1,450 square miles. Major cities in the area include Ormond Beach, Daytona Beach, New Smyrna Beach and Deland.

### Petition for Sole Source Aquifer Designation

Even though EPA has authority to initiate sole source aquifer (SSA) petitions, EPA normally responds only to submitted petitions. Any individual, corporation, company, association, partnership, state, municipality, or federal agency may petition for SSA designation.

EPA published the <u>Sole Source Aquifer Designation Petitioner Guidance</u> to assist those interested in preparing and submitting SSA designation petitions.





# 401 KAR 51:010. Attainment status designations.

NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION CABINET Department for Environmental Protection Division for Air Quality

RELATES TO: KRS 224.20-100, 224.20-110, 224.20-120, 40 CFR 81:318, 42 USC 7401-7626, 42 USC 7407, 7501-7515, 7601, 40 CFR -81, STATUTORY AUTHORITY: KRS 224.10-100, 42 USC 7401-7626 NECESSITY AND FUNCTION: KRS 224.10-100 requires the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet to prescribe administrative regulations for the prevention, abatement, and control of air pollution. This administrative regulation designates the status of all areas of the Commonwealth of Kentucky with regard to attainment of the ambient air quality standards.

Section 1. Definitions.

- (1) "Rest of State" as used in Sections 4 through 7 of this administrative regulation means the remainder of the state has been designated and identified on a county by county basis.
- (2) "Statewide" as used in Section 8 of this administrative regulation means the entire state has been designated on a county by county basis.
- (3) "Road" as used in Section 2(3) of this administrative regulation means a Kentucky route, a county road, a lane, a road, or a U.S. route, highway, or interstate.

# Section 2. Attainment Status Designations.

The attainment status of areas of the Commonwealth of Kentucky with respect to the ambient air quality standards for sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, ozone, and nitrogen oxides is listed in Sections 5 through 8 of this administrative regulation. The attainment status of areas of the Commonwealth of Kentucky with respect to total suspended particulates is listed in Section 3 of this administrative regulation.

- (2) Within sixty (60) days of revision by the U.S. EPA of a national ambient air quality standard, the cabinet shall review applicable data and submit to the U.S. EPA a revision to the attainment nonattainment list pursuant to 42 USC 7407(d)(1).
- (3) A road, junction or intersection of two (2) or more roads as used in Section 7 of this administrative regulation that defines a nonattainment boundary for an area which is a portion of a county designated as nonattainment for ozone for any classification except marginal shall include as nonattainment an area extending 750 feet from the center of the road, junction, or intersection.

Section 3. Attainment Timetable. Primary and secondary ambient air quality standards shall be attained as expeditiously as practicable.
