Reentry and Employment Services (RES)

In Summary

Develop, facilitate and deepen the effectiveness of the partners and organizations focused on the reentry populations, while building a sense of community for participants and providers.

Alignment of State, Regional and Local Partners to serve the Reentry Population.

Addressing "Pre-Entry, Reentry and Recidivism" via diversionary alternatives to confinement for individuals at the local level as a preventative measure and serving individuals who are returning to society.



RES Operations (County by County)

Putting Kentuckians First

- This program extends the digital arm of the Kentucky Career Centers.
- Bi-weekly meetings with State partners (KYAE, OVR, CDO, KCC, & RES) to discuss each person enrolled per county.
- Easily accessible by participants and partners.

Targeted Orientation Classes

- This program extends the physical arm of the Kentucky Career Centers, bringing the state partners in workforce development onsite once a month on a reoccurring date that is dependable and focused.
- Meeting the people where they are.

Community presence where the people are

- In communication with the specialty courts.
- Attend trainings with the judicial partners.
- Attend monthly drug courts.

PUTTING KENTUCKIANS FIRST

JUDICIAL REFERRALS

Judicial referrals are direct pipelines from judicial system entities, including county attorneys, child support, specialty courts, and pre-trial agencies. Putting Kentuckians First provides updates and accountability measures to judicial partners for a collective approach.

TARGETED ORIENTATION CLASSES


Targeted orientation classes serve as an extension of the local career center offices in each county. These classes are held monthly, enabling Putting Kentuckians First participants to receive referrals and interact directly with the workforce system.

JAIL REFERRALS

Jail referrals support and educate incarcerated individuals at local jails and detention centers and create pathways to Putting Kentuckians First and the workforce system.

PUTTING KENTUCKIANS FIRST

Putting Kentuckians First is the central nervous system of the justice-impacted ecosystem. It creates **two-way communication** with partner agencies, judicial, jail, community partners, employers, and the workforce system while directly serving the individuals seeking services.



PARTNERS

State, regional and local organizations remove barriers, provide referrals and direct communication to other partners on mutual efforts.

EMPLOYERS

Direct-to-employer referrals and pipeline creation ensure individuals are properly equipped and qualified for employment referrals. Maintaining and cultivating relationships with employers also helps to better understand their requirements and needs for successful referrals.

WORKFORCE SYSTEM


The workforce system engages with partners to ensure the most appropriate agencies assist individuals with available education, workforce and training resources.

Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program – SB90

- Oversight of the Education Training and Work Barrier Relief Funding
- Dedicated navigation for participants to ensure completion of educational and vocational assessments
- Coordination and funding to assist individuals in achieving educational and workforce goals

FY24

Footprint Expanded from 12 Counties to 47 Counties

- 1136 Incarcerated Individuals served through pre-release classes
- 414 Individual Assist
- 185 ID's/Birth Certificates Provided
- 452 Individuals Enrolled in PKF
- 318 Individuals Accepting our Services
- 244 Positive Employment Outcomes
- 76.73% Employment and Retention Rate




